JUST KIND OF FORGETTABLE

The news that Kelly Oubre, Jr., was declaring his intention to enter the 2015 NBA draft broke on a Tuesday night. The media jumped onboard after the Wednesday release of a pre-recorded video statement issued by Oubre and KU Athletics.

On Thursday, there was virtually no conversation around the water, even among hardcore Hawkheads.

Bottom line: it seemed like no one cared. I saw more weeping and wailing and gnashing of teeth when Xavier Henry left. Seriously.

Yes, another member of the KU Basketball family was leaving early. This time, however, it felt like a third cousin (twice removed) was leaving. This wasn't a brother or even a funny nephew. Kelly Oubre is that relative you only see once a year at Christmas or Thanksgiving or in church at Easter.

Don't get me wrong: I'm not picking on the kid. Everything points to the fact that Kelly Oubre is a wonderful young man with a ton of basketball potential whose parents put him on a good path early in life. He's made a lot of good decisions in his life.

Thing is, I wrote in this very publication several weeks back that I thought this would be a fun team to watch grow and mature and develop chemistry and be a team you didn't want to play in March. Well, that didn't happen. It was another early round exit for the Jayhawks – but I don't think many of us were surprised.

This was a team that was kind of fun to watch...sometimes. Most of the time, they drove us nuts. There was nothing consistent about this team. The trademark Bill Self/Eddie Sutton/Mr. Iba defense was on again, off again. In the last six weeks of the season, KU's outside shooters couldn't buy a basket. Then Cliff Alexander's mom decided she couldn't wait for him to start making NBA bank and ended his career a year (and, in my opinion, maybe two years) early. I saw Thomas Robinson, Part II. Now we'll never know.

The team suffered tremendously from a lack of on-court leadership. Perry Ellis is a great player, but he's not a leader. This is clearly Frank Mason's team, and no one has a better motor. Sometimes, though, you can say hello to him and he's stuck for an answer. He's not a holler guy. Maybe he'll develop into one to meet that need. He, like all of us, is a work in progress.

The lack of reaction to Oubre's announcement is a microcosm of the season just past. Despite an 11th straight Big 12 Conference title, this was a pretty unforgettable year. How forgettable? The big early entry into the NBA draft averaged nine points and five rebounds a game on the way to a second-round tournament loss.

Want to know who had better numbers at KU than Kelly Oubre? Such luminaries are Brad Sanders, Sean Alvarado and Lance Hill. Don't feel bad if you don't remember them. Not many do. They were all nice players, but not great. Just kind of forgettable -- a lot like this season.
