This year's NCAA tournament hasn't been the most exciting when it comes to buzzer beaters and upsets that make you say, "Oh, really???" But for Kansas fans, it has been wildly entertaining.

Some KU fans are finding tremendous entertainment in the fact that three former Kansas State head coaches – two of whom were run off – are still in the big dance.

Frank Martin's South Carolina Gamecocks did the nation a great service by sending the most unlikeable Duke team in the last 20 years home early. Dana Altman's thirdseeded Oregon Ducks are still in it after dodging a bullet against Rhode Island (Remember them?). Finally, you know firsthand about Bob Huggins and his Mountaineers. Their physical play and toughness will be a very tough out for Gonzaga.

Maybe the most entertaining aspect of this year's tournament for Kansas fans has been how boring it's been: a rout of UC-Davis and a 20-point win over perennial tournament power Michigan State.

The win over UC-Davis shouldn't surprise anyone, but it was refreshing to see this Kansas group hit the gas and not let up.

The 20-point difference in the KU-Michigan State game was deceiving. It may have been the closest 20-point game you've ever seen. After all, it was a five-point game with seven minutes left. And no one in their right mind wants anything to do with a Tom Izzo team in March.

What was entertaining was that Kansas may have put together their best seven minutes of defense all season. They turned it up to 11. Meanwhile, KU connected on shot after shot and chalked up a really good 90-70 win.

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- said, "At this point in the season, you are what you are," it was refreshing to see Kansas put two teams away, albeit in vastly different ways, last weekend. Most of us have become used to keeping a defibrillator handy while we watch KU games.

There's a lot to be excited about this weekend when KU takes the floor at the Sprint Center in Kansas City. It was clear last weekend that a first-round Big 12 tournament loss to TCU did nothing except give the Jayhawks an extra day or two to rest and re-focus. There was no rust at all. They looked like a oneseed all weekend.

It also has to rattle a few cages for Purdue, Oregon and Michigan. Last weekend plants seeds of doubt about the Jayhawk scouting report that says, "Kansas allows good teams to hang around. Make it an eight-minute game." The eight-minute mark may be (a) too late, or (b) the perfect time for the Jayhawks to find the turbo boost button.

Kansas guard play – the girl that brung the Jayhawks to this dance – has never been better. Landen Lucas is doing all the little thankless things he does. But regardless of what happens, this has been Bill Self's toughest, most resilient team, led by a bulldog of a point guard who we've all been privileged as fans to watch. He's a living example of what can happen when hard work and belief in one's self come together.

And regardless of whether the Jayhawks cut down the nets and hoist the hardware, the spirit, determination and courage we saw from this team all season long should resonate with Kansas Basketball fans for generations to come.
